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# FIRST SEIZURE CLINIC

### **FIRST SEIZURE CLINIC**

#### **Clinic Referral**

Your doctor thinks you may have had a seizure and would like you to see a specialist doctor who can investigate the possible causes of your seizure. You can make an appointment to see this doctor on a Friday afternoon. This clinic is called the First Seizure Clinic. What you need to do:

- Prior to attending this clinic you need to have an electroencephalogram (EEG). The purpose of an EEG is to provide information to the doctor so you can discuss whether or not you had a seizure. This test involves attaching electrodes to your head to study your brain waves. It is not invasive or painful and usually takes about an hour.
- Please contact the Neuro-diagnostic Unit between 9.00am and 5.00 pm, Monday to Friday on 9895 4639 to organise for the EEG. It usually takes within two weeks to get an appointment.
- 3. We will then book you in to the earliest available appointment to be seen in the First Seizure Clinic. Usually this will occur within two weeks of having your EEG. When making your appointment for an EEG please inform the clerical staff that this is for the First Seizure Clinic.

## **Advice about driving**

As the doctor who referred you to the clinic suspects you may have had a seizure you should **not drive** until you have been seen in the clinic.

There are laws governing your ability to drive following a suspected seizure.

Appropriate long term driving advice will be given to you by the doctors in the First Seizure Clinic. Also, it would be wise to avoid working at heights or with dangerous machinery until you have been to the clinic.

# How someone can help you if you have another seizure:

- Remain calm. The seizure will end in a minute or two and the first thing to do is to make sure that the person having the seizure will not injure themselves. This may mean lying them down on the floor and moving objects such as furniture away from the seizure vicinity.
- 2. If it is possible during the seizure, the person should be turned on their side. This may not be possible until the seizure has actually stopped.
- Do NOT put anything in the mouth or try to restrain the person having the seizure. The seizure will stop of its own accord and the tongue cannot be swallowed.
- 4. After the seizure the person can be made more comfortable by having a towel or pillow placed under their head whilst they are on their side. There may be some confusion, disorientation and/or tiredness after the seizure, so the attending person should remain nearby.
- 5. If the seizure is prolonged (more than 5 minutes) or another seizure occurs the same day or if you are worried you should contact your local doctor or call an ambulance immediately.
