STRONG COMMITMENT: Kate Locastro and Eddie Thomson are dedicated to enhancing mental health care for Aboriginal residents in the region.

Enhancing services to better meet the needs of the local Aboriginal community has been a key priority for Maroondah's Mental Health Team.

The development of the Aboriginal Clinical Engagement Project for Maroondah Mental Health Services has been crucial in improved engagement between Eastern Health and Aboriginal residents in the region.

It aims to improve access to services and outcomes for Aboriginal people as well as cultural responsiveness of services.

Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer Jo Voce has been a key adviser since the inception of the project. She has been instrumental in increasing the mental health staff understanding of the needs of our Aboriginal consumers and clients.

Eastern Health Aboriginal Engagement Clinician Kate Locastro said there had been important improvements at Maroondah Hospital Inpatient Unit (IPU) 1, IPU2, and Prevention and Recovery Care since the project was introduced.

"From the installation of Aboriginal specific information boards to reducing

barriers for Aboriginal people so they can better access PARC services, we are starting to see a positive difference being made."

Volunteer Eddie Thomson has been involved in painting feature walls at Maroondah Hospital Mental Health Services so they are in-line with Aboriginal culture.

"We can all play a part in ensuring healthcare is as accessible as possible for our local Aboriginal community," Mr Thomson said.

The hard work is starting to pay off. The percentage of Aboriginal admissions at Maroondah Hospital's Mental Health Services has increased. Ms Locastro said the Aboriginal community is increasingly becoming more aware of the services Eastern Health provides, with positive feedback and increased referrals.

"We certainly recognise there is still a lot of hard work to do. However, there have been some encouraging signs," Ms Locastro said.

"We look forward to working with the Aboriginal community in the region on how we can continue to enhance mental health care in the east."

ABORIGINAL HEALTH TEAM

Eastern Health's Aboriginal Health Team is a community-based service based in Healesville that is accessible by Aboriginal people and their families living anywhere in Eastern Health's catchment.

It provides a range of services that are available on-site in Healesville and through home visits and outreach support. These include:

- Primary health care: health checks, nursing support and general health information and education.
- Case management and advocacy: care planning, case management, referral and advocacy for other services.
- Social and emotional wellbeing: counselling services, school-based programs and education support.
- Home and community care: domestic assistance, property maintenance and social events.
