The team won the Improving Indigenous Health category, and were acknowledged for improving access to recovery oriented Adult Mental Health Services for the Aboriginal community in the east.

Among its key work has been at Maroondah Prevention and Recovery Care (PARC), where the team has worked hard to enhance services and provide a better environment to meet the needs of the local Aboriginal community.

Maroondah PARC, which Eastern Health manages in partnership with Mind Australia, provides a safe and supportive environment for people who do not need hospital care to treat their mental ill-health, but may require temporary support. It offers assistance on how to better manage illness and regain self-esteem, life skills, and opportunities to participate in community activities.

In recent years, there has been a renewed effort to engage with the local Indigenous community with an Aboriginal Clinical Engagement Project for Maroondah Mental Health Services.

Eastern Health Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer Jo Voce said the team were humbled to receive such a prestigious award. "It is wonderful that the passion the team has for enhancing mental health care for the local Aboriginal community has been recognised."

The installation of Aboriginal specific information boards, and feature walls painted by volunteer Eddie Thomson so they are in-line with Aboriginal culture, are among the positive changes which have been made at Maroondah PARC.

A special event was also held at Maroondah PARC earlier this year to highlight the importance of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural inclusiveness at local mental health services. MARQUEE EVENT: The Closing the Health Gap Family Sports Day returns next year.

## PUTTING PATIENTS FIRST

#### For 70-year-old Mavis, her recent experience in 2 North at Maroondah Hospital was a positive one.

Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer Jo Voce said the ward ensured Mavis was provided with an environment which was culturally appropriate.

"The ward worked closely with the Aboriginal Health Team and I, so we were aware what care Mavis was receiving.

"The collaboration between all of us ensured the patient was happier during her time at Maroondah Hospital. It meant as an Aboriginal woman, Mavis was provided with great respect and culturally appropriate care."

In her role, Jo would visit Mavis on a regular basis, checking in on how she was going. Jo also connected with Mavis's granddaughter, who is also Mavis's carer.

"I can't thank the staff on 2 North enough – in particular Abbey Johnson and Tracey Porter. It is the great work of individuals which plays an important part in helping us Close the Health Gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians as a whole", said Jo.

Eastern Health's Aboriginal Health Team is a community-based service based in Healesville that is accessible by Aboriginal people and their families living anywhere in Eastern Health's catchment.

It provides a range of services that are available on-site in Healesville and through home visits and outreach support. These include:

 Primary health care: health checks. nursing support

health checks, nursing support and general health information and education.

- Case management and advocacy: care planning, case management, referral and advocacy for other services.
- Social and emotional wellbeing: counselling services, school-based programs and education support.
- Home and community care: domestic assistance, property maintenance and social events.
